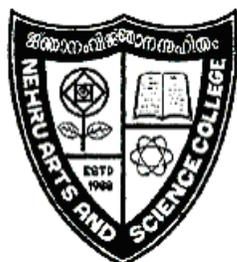

### 3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

1. Sahityavedi constructed a 'Snehaved' Buds School at Ambalathara in continuation of its efforts in rehabilitation of the victims of endosulfan spraying. The same was inaugurated by Sri Suresh Gopi M.P. on 28.08.2017.
2. A field trip to Maadayippara for III B. Sc. Zoology students on 25.08.2017.
3. Observance of World Environment Day: The Science Club, in association with Department of Zoology conducted various programmes like Painting competition, Documentary/ film shows. Activities like powerpoint presentations, bio-fencing in the campus, planting of butterfly host plants in the butterfly garden, planting of saplings in the campus etc were also conducted. The Department of Botany planted 25 New medicinal plants in the medicinal garden on 05.06.2017. The garden has a collection of 102 medicinal plants. The NSS units planted 50 saplings in the college campus. The NCC unit also observed the World Environment Day by planting medicinal plants.
4. Observance of Ozone Day: Programmes were organized by the Science Club during the period from the 12th to the 30th of September, 2017.
5. Department of Botany planted 43 rare and endangered plants in the santhisthalam of the college. In the santhisthalam of biodiversity, a total of 79 such plants are conserved.
6. Organic farming: The Department of Botany has introduced organic farming in the college campus. The farm consists of Ladies finger, Capsicum, Chilly, Brinjal, Passion fruit etc.
7. Discussion on 'Environment and Acacia' on 09.06.2017 organized by the Sahithyavedi.

8. On 12th August 2017, a class on environment called Madhuram Kalalayamuttam was conducted by the NSS in association with Green Earth Kerala, Kanhangad.
9. Birthdays of the NSS volunteers are being celebrated by planting saplings in the campus.
10. Another programme by the NSS, namely, Kadaloram Kanakathulyam - a community programme conducted on 15th August 2017, by removing plastics from the sea shore of Ozhinhalappu Kadappuram.
11. For protecting Thanneerthadam, on 19th August 2017, an oath taking programme was conducted by the NSS volunteers at Ozhinhalappu thanneerthadam.
12. On 14th September 2017, a Medicinal Garden Making programme was conducted in association with JCI , Nileshwar.
13. The NCC cadets collected the seeds of native mangoes and gave to the Mathrubhumi officials as part of protecting the native mango varieties.
14. A Fruit garden was set up by the NCC units by planting 20 varieties of fruit plant saplings on 5 th August 2017.
15. On 15th September 2017, an elocution competition was conducted for the college students on the topic Gender equality in association with JCI , Nileshwar.

The College adopted management systems like SPARK, GAINPF and other systems in collaboration with government agencies. The Student Management System developed and maintained by the college helps to monitor the academic and co-curricular activities of students.

##### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The faculty of the college plays a significant role in structuring the curriculum of the university. 8 of our faculty serve as members of Boards of Studies of different subjects in the Kannur University. Two of them are serving as board chairmen.

### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Internal examinations are conducted periodically following the university patterns. Students are also required to submit assignments, projects and make presentations in seminars.

The continuous evaluation component of the evaluation bears 20% of the total marks in each course. The assessment is based on a predetermined transparent system involving written tests, assignments/seminars/viva and attendance in respect of theory courses and lab involvement and records, tests and attendance in respect of practical courses.

Results of the continuous evaluation are published on the department notice board and transparency is ensured.

Results are analysed at the department level and at the college level by the Academic Monitoring Committee after publication of results.

### 6.3.4 Research and Development.

The institution has a Research Advisory Committee to guide the students and faculty. The Committee initiates to inculcate research aptitude in the institution.

- Motivate teachers and students to participate in National/International Seminars, Conferences and Workshops.
- Persuade the departments to organize seminars/workshops at state/national/international levels with the financial assistance from the College and other funding agencies like UGC, DST, KSCSTE etc.
- Assess the infrastructural requirements for the research and take initiatives for the procurement.
- Acquire more reference books and journals and also subscribe online resources.

### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

A good collection of books, e-books and e-journals is available in the Library. Apart from this, students and staff have unlimited and free access to internet. The college library is computerised and manages its transactions by software. Teachers and students have the facility to browse journals through INFLIBNET. N-LIST is subscribed to enable the teachers and students to refer a large number of online journals. Apart from that, hard copies of important journals in all subjects are made available. Usage of LCD projectors is promoted among teachers as well as students.

### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The College has a decentralized structure involving various clubs and committees to perform different tasks. Apart from involvement in academic and administrative activities, the service of teachers, non teaching staff and students are utilized in co-curricular, extra curricular, extension activities, organization of seminars etc.

### 6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The recruitment of faculty is done as per the government/university norms. The process involves government nominee, university nominee, subject expert and the representatives of the college and the management. The final selection is made in an interview by an interview board constituted as per the rules and guidelines specified in the Kannur University statute, which includes a Government nominee, subject expert allotted by the University and Management nominee. The rank list is prepared considering the performance of the candidates in the examination, the performance in the interview, the aptitude and attitude of the candidates etc. If the process is delayed by problems beyond the control of the college, temporary posting is done on ad hoc basis with the financial support of the PTA.

### **7. Innovations and Best Practices**

7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.

Waste management and usage of renewable energy sources are in practice.

Plantation “Shantistal”: Planting trees is a regular exercise of the NSS, NCC, Botany Department and biodiversity club. As a step to preserve the Nileshwar river, Mangrove saplings were planted on the banks of the river by our NCC students. Biodiversity Club has established a “Shantistal” a man-made forest ecosystem for conserving rare, endemic and endangered plants in the college premises in collaboration with Kerala State Biodiversity Board.

NSS and Dept. of Botany has established an Organic vegetable garden in the campus using bio-fertilizers, which includes slurry from the bio-gas plants and bio-pesticides. This has reinforced the state wide movement for promoting bio-farming, apart from motivating the students to get involved in farming at their homes.

Online Learning Platform: Moodle: A free and open-source software learning management system Moodle is being used.

Online Feedback System for all stake holders: A comprehensive online feedback system for collecting and analysing the feedbacks from Students, Alumni, Parents is introduced.

Best Library User Award: To encourage the reading and reference habits among students, the college PTA offered the best library user award to two students who make the best use of the library every year.

Endowments and Awards: As a measure for encouraging academically outstanding students, round 200 cash awards and endowments are instituted by various agencies including PTA Cash Awards, Management Cash Awards, C.K. Nair Memorial Endowment, NASCA Member Scholarship etc. To promote the cultural activities among students, the management has introduced an ever rolling silver trophy for the winner group in the college level fest.

Free Wheel Chair: College PTA has constructed sliding pathway for physically challenged students and also provided with wheel chair by NSS Units in college.

Miss a Meal Programme is conducted by NSS Units by spending time with the patients of palliative care centre, Kanhangad and also supplied a quintal of rice as a humble support by missing their meals for a day.

Career Guidance and Placement Service: Centre for career and counselling cell functions in the college to provide career information, guidance and training to the students of the college. The centre provides useful information on recruitment procedure, training facilities, service conditions and employment opportunities.

Lahari Virudhavedi: Lahari virudhavedi is to help the students to desist themselves from consumption of alcohol, tobacco, narcotics etc which is widely rampant among students. Programmes are undertaken to make the students aware of the abuse of alcohol and drugs.

Student Counselling Centre: For the first year students, a counselling programme is arranged to motivate the students to free themselves from their inhibitions and tensions. The centre takes care of those students who really need special attention. Apart from this, service of efficient psycho therapists and professional counsellors are ensured on the campus and Girls hostel every year.

Safety: Installation of CCTV cams in the prime locations of institutions including corridor and main entrances enables the protection of valuables in the campus and helps maintaining discipline.

Class wise PTA: Parent Teacher Student meetings are convened in the college to discuss the academic and co curricular activities in the college. Before each semester and prior to the commencement of semester examinations, meeting is held to provide ample chances for correction and improvements in the learning progression of the student and conveyed the academic and discipline matters to parent. Teachers maintain a positive approach with parents, and an up to date performance of student is intimated to lead and correct them in a right pathway.

Tutorial System: With the objective of developing a very healthy student-teacher relationship, a tutorial system is functioning the College. Students can freely discuss all matters related to their study and personal problems with the tutor during the tutorial sessions regularly (All Wednesday 3.30 pm - 4.30 pm). Making a sincere effort to solve the problems of the students, the tutors gives proper counselling to the students, and play a very significant role in moulding good character and conduct.

Walk With A Scholar and Scholar Support programme: The WWS scheme arranges specialized mentoring programmes for students in UG programmes and provide guidance for their future. Each student is guided by an internal mentor as well as external mentors. The scheme is open to all students entering the first year of the UG programmes, subject to a maximum of 30 students.

The Scholar Support Programme (SSP) aims at extending personalized additional support to students in the selected subjects included in the curriculum through tutorials, study materials, additional lectures, question banks and interactive sessions for 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th semesters. This programme is implemented by New Initiatives in Higher Education, Directorate of Collegiate Education.

## **Annexure I**

### **Best Practice - 1**

1. Title of the Practice: Providing shelter and medical help to the endosulfan victims of Kasargod District.

2. Goal:

The goal of the practice is manifold. There are a lot of endosulfan victims around us who live in pathetic conditions. We should use our might to help them in some way or other.

3. The Context:

The health hazards that the people of Kasargod had to endure due to ariel spray of the killer pesticide endosulfan is the biggest of its kind in world. Thousands of people were also killed due to the ariel spray of the pesticide for 25 years in 5000 acres of cashew plantation spread over 11 panchayaths. More than ten thousand persons including children were affected by various diseases and they live very pathetic life. The area is inhabited by comparatively less educated or illiterate and poor people. The Sahithya Vedi, an agency promoting extension activities in the college, is in the fore front of the struggles and other efforts organized to help the victims get justice.

Dr. Ambikasuthan M., the Head of the Department of Malayalam and the President of the group is a champion of environmental protection. He has given leadership to various struggles and has written more than 40 articles on this issue in periodicals. It was quite accidentally that the project was started.

4. The Practice:

Pained by the deplorable plight of the inhabitants and patients of the area the companion took the bold decision to build houses for those destitute. Till now 8 houses have been completed and their keys have been handed over. From 2003 onwards the poor patients in the affected area are provided free supply of medicines.

The programme is implemented under the leadership of the "Sahithya Vedi", a companionship of students and teachers of various departments that works under the supervision and leadership of the well known writer, environmentalist and social worker Dr. Ambikasuthan Mangad of the Department of Malayalam. If the applicant does not have own land, local bodies like panchayath, municipality etc. were contacted to get them land sanctioned. Though we have received applications from the neighbouring districts also, only applications from Kasargod district were considered. The key handing over ceremony of the first had a wide coverage in newspapers and TV, consequent to which more applications for houses were received by us. Therefore we laid down the condition that only victims who are poor and have been identified by the government and issued biometric card in which experts from medical

college certifies that the card holder is a victims will be considered. The received applications are scrutinized first, following which enquiries about the applicants financial and other conditions are made by visiting their villages and contacting the villagers. After the choosing the beneficiary of the house, a massive organising committee will be convened in the village including the social workers, environmentalists, representatives of local bodies, MLA, Panchayath President, and other important personalities in the area. Only voluntary contributions will be accepted and no requests for contributions are made. The construction work is completed with the cooperation of the skilled labourers, members of various organisations, Kudumbasree and the members of sahithyavedi. Maximum effort is made to avoid employing paid labourers. As a result, on completion of each project a big community that works for the society is formed in that place. For each house Suresh Gopi contributes three to four lakhs. The houses built costs approximately ten lakhs. The house will be equipped with water tank, toilet, smokeless fireplace, electricity connection and basic electrical items, basic furniture, etc.

A Buds School named “Snehaveed”, with a cost of 50 lakhs, for the victims of the killer poison, whose construction was fulfilled in this year. The buds school has facilities like western toilet attached play ground for the use of the differently abled children, special transport vehicles connecting the houses of the children and the school, dining hall, separate kitchen, etc.

#### 5. Evidence of Success:

- a) Seven houses built and provided by the sahithya vedi are serving as the central star around which the community formed during the construction work is still operative.
- b) Impressed by the grandeur of the project, the news papers and the television channels gave wide coverage and publicity to the events. The album of newspaper reports has been kept in the Malayalam Department.
- c) The project gave very high reputation to the college in the state.
- d) Many other colleges and schools followed the suit by building houses for the destitutes/patients/endosulfan victims.
- e) We have received more than hundred requests for houses, out which thirty have been filtered and kept for future consideration.
- f) Some of the families who could not complete their houses also approached us for help.
- g) The family structure of many houses improved after the house was handed over.

- h) Standing testimony to the acceptability of the project among the people, many philanthropists in and out the country has made voluntary contributions. Many common
- i) people as well as others have come foreword to join us for the success of the
- j) buds school being constructed.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- a) Since the college is following semester system, students do not get much free time to spend for the project. At present they work on Saturdays, Sundays and other holidays for the success of the project.
- b) The Sahithyavedi intends to build a few more houses. But finding time for the organizing and implementation is a big hurdle before us.
- c) We encountered financial problem also in some cases. Sometimes the office bearers of the organization are forced to spend money for the project.
- d) The increase in the cost of materials used for construction, and unavailability of
- e) materials like sand, laterite stone etc. also bring some difficulties.

### **Best Practice - 2**

Title of the Practice:

Scaffolding the Creative Writing and its Publication for enlightening the students and society towards a better tomorrow.

2. Goal:

Education is a process for the all round of development . Developing the creativity of the students will transform them into selfless and sociable individuals with qualities like wisdom, kindheartedness, and social commitment.

Effective, powerful and pragmatic deliberations is important to successful creative writing. Without authentic-sounding conversation, a beginners characters and plot will appear unformed. Discussions enable to reveal individual character and add sparkle to the writings. The Creative writings are exposed to the public through proper publication.

With this aim in mind, ceaseless practice by the College, led by Department of Malayalam, is on in conducting literary discussion sessions for the students and staff of all disciplines on every Friday for the last 30 years. Sahityavedi and leading publishers are publishing the creative writings of students, staff and alumni.

3. The Context:

The Kasargod District lags behind the other parts of Kerala socially, economically and educationally. Creating awareness like eradication of superstitious beliefs, environmental protection, bio-farming, side effect of excessive use of pesticides, gender equality, human rights among the people is of paramount importance in this context. Quoting Bacon-“Reading maketh a full man, conference a ready man and writing an exact man”. Therefore, providing the society reading materials dealing with problems and matters directly linked with their day to day life is an important step that an educational institution can take. The practice further helps to preserve traditional and indigenous treasure of knowledge in the fields like language and local dialect, culture, heritage, art, folklore, farming.

The students of our college, who make outstanding performances in the University level

in academic as well as co-curricular activities have innate traits to achieve this goal. Channelising their creativity in the proper direction is what is important. It is this realization that prompted the college to launch such a project.

#### 4. The Practice:

The College encourages publication of creative writings and the necessary scaffolding is done by the Department of Malayalam. Students are motivated to pen their thoughts and the writings are discussed for refinement. After refinement, the writings are published by the “Sahityavedi” or by the leading publishers in the State.

Publication cost is usually met collectively by the department. Some of the writings of the students have been published in reputed periodicals like Mathrubhoomi, Madhyamam, Manorama. Later such publications are collected and published as edited books.

The practice gives encouragement for students to write more. The topics covered by the articles are often related to important social issues and this helps to nurture social commitment among the students. Books on environmental issues like harmful use of chemical fertilizers, hunting animals in connection with certain ceremonies etc. have been published like this. Students learn great lessons about the importance of reciprocity of human beings and the environment around him. The practice has helped to transform the students of Nehru Arts and Science College Kanhangad into a community that intervenes in environmental and other social issues. The book named “Ponjaru” (meaning nostalgia) on local dialects of Kasargod district is another innovative publishing of our students. This book received state-wide appreciation and tempted several other groups to follow the suit. In the new era of globalization, in which many local languages are being thrown off, the publications like “Ponjaru” serve the purpose of a measure towards the conservation of our culture and languages.

So far the department of Malayalam has published 14 books. The book “Nhaattuvela” includes memoirs of 100 renowned writers including the “Jnanpith” laureate Padmabhusan M. T. Vasudevan Nair. The novel “Abhayarthikalude lokham” published by Mathrubhoomi was written collectively by 11 students of the College. The novel “Jeevithathinte upama” published by DC books was written collectively 13 students. On the 100th birth centenary of noted writer Vaikom Muhammed Basheer, the “Sahityavedi” released the book “100 Basheer”, which includes writings of 100 leading writers about Basheer. The book “Vayanatu Kulavan” published in collaboration with “Naithal” and Environmental organization in Kasaragod District, is an eye opener against the unnecessary, unjustified and cruel animal hunting. The book “Athyeye Puthiyee” consists of 24 short stories and poetries of 11 students of the

college. The book "Athibouthikavum Prathirodhavum" comprises of articles of 15 students. The book "Kavitha Kalam Desham" published in 2013 contains 7 selected articles presented in the seminar conducted on 16, 17 February 2017 in the college of which, 5 articles are of our students and 2 articles are of our teaching staff. The book "Vakkinte Velicham" published in 2014 contains 10 selected articles presented in the seminar conducted on 8, 9 August 2014 in the college with the financial assistance from the UGC. The book "Short Flames" about cinema, the book "Post Card" by our Student Aneesh Vengat, the book "Chirakatta Robin" by the student Soumya Muzhakkometc are a few examples. The second edition of "Ponjaru" was published in Dubai of UAE by the cultural organisation of our alumni "Jwala", in 2015. This edition was done by 1000 and odd students of our College. 300 copies of the book was sold in U.A.E. The "Nanma", an organisation of expat malayalees in Muscut has requested to publish the third edition of this book. The book "Ormakal Yathrakal" (2015), "Endosulfan Sathyavum Mithyayum" (2016) were written by our alumnus. The book "Hajar Pushakam" includes works of 12 famous writers, who are alumni of the college.

This unique practice raised the dignity of Nehru Arts and Science College Kanhangad into heights and spread the reputation of the College in and outside the State.

To promote creative writing, a short story workshop was organized by Sahityavedi this year. 40 students participated in the Kerala Sahitya Academy Kadalezhuth Literary Camp at Nileshtar.

#### 5. Evidence of Success:

- a) Many of the students who were active participants of the project became writers in future. Noted writer and Kendra Sahitya Academi award winner and cinema script writer Shajikumar P. V., noted writer and cinema script writer Santhosh Achikaanam, noted writers Biju Kanhangad, Naalapaadam Padmanabhan etc. are a few examples. (b) 300 copies of the second edition of the book "Ponjaru" was sold out in UAE. Several eminent linguists sent us words of appreciation about this book. Many periodicals wrote articles about this book. The biggest dictionary in Malayalam named "Shabda
- b) Thaaravali" included 200 words from this book in their new edition.
- c) Several other organisations published books on local dialects after reading "Ponjaru".
- d) 'Poliyendram' documentary was made during this year.

#### 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

The main problem faced by the “Sahithyavedi” is related with financial expenses in connection with the programs organized. This was met to a certain extent by assistance from alumni, students, staff and alumni association abroad.
